Webinar on "Myths to Market: Images of Women and Gender Politics" on March 14, 2022 at 11 am by Dr. Pankaj K. Singh.

Gender Cell of Vidyasagar College for Women organised a webinar on "Myths to Market: Images of Women and Gender Politics" on March 14, 2022 at 11 am. Dr. Pankaj K. Singh, former Professor and Chairperson of the Department of English, Himachal Pradesh University, discussed how gender is seen as pervading the realm of politics in that it reflects the distribution of power and reinforces notions of masculinity and femininity.

She focused on the ways in which gender dynamics operate in the family, the labour market, and the polity — that explain why women have been historically marginalized. Gender is not just personal identity, it is social identity. It arises from our relationships to other people, and it depends upon social interaction and social recognition. As such, Dr. Singh highlighted that it influences how we understand ourselves in relation to others. The politics of gender examines how society influences our understandings and perception of differences between "masculinity" (what society deems appropriate behaviour for a "man") and "femininity" (what society deems appropriate behaviour for a "woman").Dr.Singh examined how this, in turn, influences identity and social practices. She gave special emphasis on the power relationships that follow from the established gender order in a given society, as well as how this changes over time. The speaker highlighted, gender is an act, gender is not a state of being, citing suitable incidents from The Ramayana, The Mahabharata, Indian myths and folklores. Finally, she discussed stereotyped representations of women in modern media and advertisement and how women need to think beyond such stereotypes.
